Dear GMCS Families and Friends,

We have successfully completed our first quarter of a hybrid educational model. We started our 20/21 school year cautiously by having a synchronous hybrid model and the option for full remote learning. Despite many technical obstacles, we established a solid routine for our students. We started back to 5 days in person learning during the week of November 9. We continue to offer a hybrid and a full remote option for those who prefer either of those options. We have updated our Health and Safety Plan to reflect any changes that have been made since August.

Every three years, Pennsylvania public schools create a Comprehensive Plan that outlines a plan for the next three years. Our Comprehensive Plan was submitted this fall and our areas of focus are implementing Heggerty Phonemic Awareness with fidelity, using Enhanced Core Reading Instruction, embedding Montessori Works into our reading and math curricula, and further Montessori, Eureka, and Zearn training and refreshers for our teachers.

Our building addition is finally underway! We are so excited and can see progress daily. We update our Facebook page weekly with photos of the progress so be sure to check them out. The final product will be a K-2nd wing, a 3rd-6th wing, a library, and an art room. This will be completed in the summer of 2021. What an exciting time to be a part of the Gettysburg Montessori Charter School family! Our motto this year is patience, flexibility, and teamwork!

Classroom Updates

Kindergarten

Mrs. Ponahue & Mrs. Lawrence - It has been an exciting start to our school year! We have been working hard on learning rules, routines, and procedures in our classroom.

In Wonders Reading, we have been reading and discussing weekly topics, including what makes us special, families, what we can do (now that we are getting older), how to be a good friend and using our five senses and shapes. Our sight words so far are: I, can, the, we, see, like, to (please practice your sight words at home too!).

In Eureka Math, we have learned to count, build, read and write, and find the hidden partners within the numbers 1-10. We are beginning to explore connections between these numbers with the phrases "1 more" and "1 less". In our next module we will be exploring how to recognize and make shapes.

During the month of October, we learned about fire safety and started discussing various community helpers. In the month of November, we will continue to discuss safety and are excited for a police officer to come be a guest reader in our classroom.

The students had a great time during our Fall party. We painted pumpkins, played games and did crafts.

3rd & 4th

Having the students split for the core subjects allows time to focus on grade level standards, more time to meet the children's individual educational needs, and a more focused environment during core instruction.

Classroom Updates

What a whirlwind to the beginning of this school year! We have adapted our instruction to meet all the needs of our students through online instruction as well as offering some days in person instruction. We are excited to learn that we will be offering 5 days in person instruction and are looking forward to seeing our students in person!

This month the students are really enjoying Artist in Residence, learning about the Renaissance period. If you get a chance, ask your child about what they have learned so far and let them show you his or her expertise.

ELA

Ms. Dohler has been excited to join the 3/4 ELA classroom and has already seen the many skills that the students have gone over in the first quarter!

The students have been introduced to many types of genres, including; literature (fiction), realistic fiction, historical fiction, narrative non-fiction, informational text (nonfiction), expository, biographies, fantasy, drama and folktales.

This quarter, third grade read about many different topics. Some topics include; lessons in stories, different traditions in other cultures, inventions, landmarks and memorials, and working together to solve problems. The fourth graders covered topics about how actions affect others, where good ideas come from, natural disasters, how science helps us understand how things work, starting a business to help others, and messages in stories. Both 3rd and 4th grade students have been practicing building reading comprehension by visualizing, making predictions, identifying the characters, setting, plot, problem and solution, main idea and key details of a text, and asking and answering questions.

Math

In Mrs. Taylor's 3/4 math class, students have been very busy. Third grade jumped right into multiplication and division and are learning quickly! They have become experts at skip counting.

Fourth grade started the year out with a lot of review, and are slowly building onto new topics like multiplying by 1,000 and converting and solving measurement problems. We all are becoming better mathematicians as we progress.

Science/ Social Studies/ Writing

Third and fourth grade have been very busy this year so far in Mrs. Bechtel's class! We started the year learning all about being a scientist and the wonders of science. We moved on to spiders and bats where the students completed their first project of the year. Next, we moved on to weather and climate. We finished the quarter studying the skeletal system.

Moving forward into the second quarter, the students voted for this year's science fair theme. At this time, results have not been revealed! We will learn more about the President and the White House. To finish out the second quarter, we will explore the first Thanksgiving and cultures from around the world.

5th & 6th

Mrs. Gulden & Mrs. Sauter - **Well, what a start it has been!** Odd and eventful, but also a learning opportunity for everyone involved. Teachers and students alike had to take a couple weeks to learn how to navigate and utilize Google Classrooms. As classes formally began, students worked on novels in ELA and a variety of math concepts during math calls. Fifth graders started the year with The BFG and have since moved into Hidden Figures. This book will continue into quarter two. Sixth graders read Chains, a historical fiction novel, and wrapped up with the end of the quarter. Quarter two will bring the start of Almost Astronauts. In math, fifth graders covered powers of ten, reading and writing decimals in multiple forms, and addition/subtraction/ multiplication/division using decimals. The focus for sixth graders was all about ratios. Students learned how to identify ratios and used many strategies to create equivalent ratios. They have also learned how to create an equation as an introduction to pre-algebra.

As for science and social studies, we covered cells and the election process. Students also had the opportunity to research a person of interest while completing their Biography Projects. The next project will look into a country of their choice during the Market Day Project that will be coming home immediately following Thanksgiving.

Artists in Residence was another great experience this quarter. Students did a fantastic job with the virtual format of these Civil War lessons and creating their own quilts. These were showcased at the Show and Tell event November 11th.

We are really looking forward to diving further into the year with the students in quarter 2!.

MUSIC NOTES

Happy fall everyone! I'm super excited to be the new Music Teacher here at GMCS. The 1st Quarter has gone very well! We began the school year with talking about the Elements of Music in each class. Kindergarten and 1st/2nd Grade we



have talked about Steady Beat, High/Low, Solfege, and Fast/Slow or Tempo. The students were introduced to a fun education music program called Chrome Music Lab. The students were able to play around with several sections in Chrome Music Lab to help create their own music. For 3rd/4th Grade and 5th/6th Grade we went over in detail what each Element of Music is. We have talked about Rhythm, Pitch, Tempo, Duration, and Intensity. The students were also introduced to Chrome Music Lab and were able to write their own music using the program. I'm looking forward to seeing how the next part of the year will go! RTI

Response to Intervention (RTI) may sound complicated, but it is a fairly simple process. All students from elementary through high school participate in the RTI process. It starts in the classroom (what we call Tier 1), where students receive core instruction. Gettysburg Montessori Charter School uses Wonders to deliver our core reading instruction and Eureka for math. At Tier 1, the teacher gathers data on the student's performance within the classroom teacher for Tier 2 services. These services are performed by the RTI teacher in a small group setting, away from distractions of the regular classroom. Lessons are provided three to five days a week for approximately 30 minutes, based on individual student needs. If students make progress, they may be moved to Tier 3. Tier 3 means that the student will receive lessons every day for 30-40 minutes in an even smaller group setting. Depending on the growth of the student in this Tier, special education services may be recommended.

RTI is not a specific program or type of teaching. It is a proactive, data driven approach that measures students' skills to determine further instructional interventions. The RTI process is very fluid and students enter and exit tiers based on data supported needs. Through the RTI process we can identify students who are in need of additional support and provide the supports they need to be successful.
