Classroom Updates

Kindergarten

Mrs. Fleurant & Mrs. Lawrence - It has been an exciting start to our school year! We have been working hard on learning rules, routines, and procedures in our classroom.

In Wonders Reading, we have been reading and discussing weekly topics, including what makes us special, families, what we can do (now that we are getting older), how to be a good friend and using our five senses.

Our sight words so far are: I, can, the, we, see, like.(please practice your sight words at home too!).

Letters of the week: Mm, Aa, Pp, Tt, Ss.

In Eureka Math, we have learned to count, build, read and write, and find the hidden partners within the numbers 1-10. We are beginning to explore connections between these numbers with the phrases "1 more" and "1 less". In our next module we will be exploring how to recognize and make shapes.

During the month of October, we learned about fire safety and started discussing various community helpers. We would like to thank the Gettysburg Fire Company for bringing a ladder truck to the school and teaching us about fire safety!

The students had a great time during our Fall party. We enjoyed dressing up in costumes, playing games and doing crafts.

This quarter we worked on the 4 Montessori Respect Rules: respect self, respect others, respect the environment and respect materials. Throughout the year we will continue to work on how to be independent workers and how to make good choices during work time.

1st & 2nd

Mrs. Needham - We are off to a wonderful start in room 141!

We completed a science study about nocturnal animals. The students loved learning about all the different animals that are active at night. We culminated our study with an animal report about the nocturnal animal they read about during guided reading.

During Language Arts, first grade has learned about their bodies in motion, sharing, and their special pets. Second grade has learned about friends, families, and caring for a pet. Both grades have been doing an excellent job sharing about themselves and their ideas through their daily writing. Ask your first grader to tell you the difference between a sentence that ends with a period, question mark, and exclamation mark.

During Math, first grade has been mastering addition and subtraction to 10 and how they relate to one another. Second grade has been learning about two digit addition and subtraction, measuring items both large and small, and place value. Ask your second grader to tell you the word, expanded, and standard form of a number under 1,000.

We will continue to learn to follow directions given by the teacher, to respect our classroom and supplies, and raise our hand when we have something to share. Ask your child what happens when the teacher says "Macaroni and cheese!"

We look forward to seeing how everyone continues to grow throughout the vear!

Mrs. Lansford - Our first guarter in Room 145 has been amazing!

We quickly earned our first class award for the year. The students chose to build haunted houses! I loved seeing each students individuality shine through in their creations.

We continue to work on meeting classroom expectations by raising our hands when we want to ask a question. We also are learning how to work independently, to respect the classroom, and to manage our time well.

We have learned about bats, which is a perfect topic for October! Bats are interesting creatures. The class enjoyed learning about the different types of bats, especially the large Flying Fox and the teeny-tiny Bumblebee bat.

In 1st grade Language Arts we have been learning how our bodies move, how to share, and how pets can be special. In math, 1st graders have been learning how to create number bonds and addition or subtraction sentences using those number bonds, how to balance number sentences, and how to add and subtract within 10.

2nd grade has learned how families work together, which includes chores family members may have. The students enjoyed sharing what chores they complete at home. We also learned how a pet can be a friend, and how we care for animals. In math we learned how to measure by measuring items in the classroom and comparing their lengths. We are now learning place values, and how to write numbers using their number name, their expanded form, and their standard form.

We are looking forward to next quarter and hope it will be as great as the first quarter was!

Miss. Stowman - The first couple months in Room 143 have been awesome! I've had so much fun getting to know you and your kids over these last few months. Each of the children have grown a tremendous amount already since being back in the classroom. They continue to amaze me very day with how much knowledge and curiosity they have in those little brains!

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We continue to work on meeting classroom expectations by raising our hands when we want to ask a question, and not shouting out comments or answers throughout the day. We are learning how to work independently, respect the classroom and Montessori Works, stay in our seats, and manage our time more efficiently! We are working towards a new class reward when we fill our stellar stone jar, so it's important that we demonstrate qualities of lifelong learning in the classroom, to earn those stones!

3rd & 4th

Mrs. Bechtel, Ms. Pohler & Mrs. Taylor - We would like to welcome our incoming 3rd graders and welcome back our 4th graders! Third and fourth grade comes with new challenges and opportunities to grow. Having the students split for the core subjects allows time to focus on grade level standards, more time to meet the children's individual educational needs, and a more focused

environment during core instruction.

We began our school year with our ribbon cutting ceremony followed by an open house. We are excited to be in our new school!

This month the students have enjoyed the "Dream Big, Be a Scientist" science exhibit and are looking forward to our upcoming field trip to Hollabaugh's Farm. Students will be able to pick a pumpkin, pick apples, and enjoy a wagon ride around the farm to coincide with their science unit study of the Life Cycle of a Pumpkin.

ELA - I am excited to start a new year with our incoming 3rd graders and our returning 4th graders!

Both 3rd and 4th grade students have been introduced to many types of genres, including; literature (fiction), realistic fiction, historical fiction, narrative nonfiction, informational text (nonfiction), expository, biographies, fantasy, drama and folktales. We have enjoyed our time studying these genres in our brand new library with Mrs. Windover!

This quarter, third grade has read about many different topics. Some topics include; lessons in stories, different traditions in other cultures, inventions, landmarks and memorials, and working together to solve problems. The fourth graders covered topics about how actions affect others, where good ideas come from, natural disasters, how science helps us understand how things work, starting a business to help others, and messages in stories. Both 3rd and 4th grade students have been practicing building reading comprehension by visualizing, making predictions, identifying the characters, setting, plot, problem and solution, main idea and key details of a text, and asking and answering questions.

We have been working hard in our small groups and will be introducing literature circles in the second quarter! This will provide students an opportunity to dive deeper into the books they read and work collaboratively with one another and challenge each other to grow as active readers! We have also included a Word of the Day study so make sure to ask your scholar which words they have learned about so far!

Math-In Mrs. Taylor's 3/4 math class, students have been very busy. Third graders have already covered multiplying and dividing by 2's, 3's, and 4's, reviewed time, and are now working on measuring weight, fluids, and length! They have become experts at skip counting. Not to be left out, fourth graders have mastered multiplying by 10, 100, and 1,000 as well as converting and solving measurement problems. All students are becoming better mathematicians as they progress.

We are looking forward to what the next semester brings!

Science/ Social Studies/ Writing - Third and fourth graders have been very busy this year so far in Mrs. Bechtel's class! We started the year learning all about being a scientist and the wonders of science. The students are now masters of the steps to the Scientific Method! We moved on to life cycles of pumpkins and sunflowers where the students were able to dissect each one to study their parts. They learned songs for both life cycles.

We have now started our Embryology unit. We have 12 eggs in incubation and in 21 days, the chicks will arrive! During this unit, the students will become egg-sperts on the Life Cycle of a Chicken from the embryo to adult. There will be permission slips coming home with students who are interested in giving the chicks a good home.

Coming soon in the second quarter, we will begin Social Studies. We will be studying the 50 United States and will explore cultures from around the world.

5th & 6th

Mrs. Gulden, Mrs. Naugle & Mrs. Sauter - Quarter one has come and gone so quickly this year. Check out all the fun stuff we have already accomplished!

ELA: First quarter was the start of novels for fifth and sixth grade. Fifth graders have read and enjoyed The BFG. We will be beginning a new novel at the start

of quarter two, Esperanza Rising. 6th grade has been working through and will continue Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief and connected texts in Greek Mythology. This is by far a student favorite every year.

Math: In 5th grade, we focussed on place value of whole numbers and decimals, as well as decimal operations: adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing decimals. Students worked in a variety of different ways to help them understand the value of a decimal. Next quarter, our focus will move into multidigit multiplication and division of whole numbers. The 6th grade class spent the first quarter learning about ratios. This was a very large unit, but students did a great job representing ratios in fractional form, through charts and graphs, and in equations. In the second quarter we will be focussing on division of fractions and decimals and multi-digit decimal operations.

Science/S.S.: This quarter, 5th grade has covered scientific method and what it means to be a scientist as well as matter. Matter studies included properties of matter and physical and chemical changes. Social studies' focus was on the regions of the United States. 6th grade focused on scientific method to start, followed by layers of Earth and atmosphere. For social studies, we looked at the world map and different types of maps. Next quarter we will be moving into Earth and space and cultures for 5th grade, and 6th grade will focus on the changing earth and regions of the world.

Projects: Students will be completing their first project for the year shortly after the quarter ends. Students did a biography project on an influential person of their choice. Please be on the lookout for your child's next project right after Thanksgiving Break!

Artists in Residence: Students were fortunate enough to get to complete their first round of Artists in Residence in person this year. Students learned about a variety of dances through the decades and had the opportunity to learn how to create lace.

MUSIC NOTES

Hello everyone! It has been amazing to have music class in a classroom for the first time. Students have been making wonderful music. The students have been learning about the basics of what makes music the way it is.



Kindergarten - We have been talking about steady beats, high/low sounds, and fast/slow music (tempo).

1/2 Grade - We have been learning about high/low sounds, solfege, and tempo.

 $3/4\,Grade$ - We have been learning about the Elements of Music. We have talked about Duration, Pitch (reading treble clef), and Timbre.

5/6 Grade - We have been learning about the Elements of Music. We have talked about Duration, Pitch (reading treble clef, bass clef, and the grand staff), and Timbre.

ART

Kindergarten has been working through our line unit, first learning about line types and now learning about famous artist Wassily Kandinsky and his use of "scribble" lines! 1st through 6th grades are

making our yearly self portraits. I always love to see how they change each and every year, not just because they've grown in size, but in their artistic abilities as well!

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Our processes for identifying students who may be eligible for special education services include, but are not limited to, school-wide benchmark assessments, Multi System of Tiered Support (MTSS) including Response to Intervention (RTI), Speech and Language screenings, Occupational Therapy screenings, Physical Therapy screenings, teacher referrals, and parent requests. Gettysburg Montessori Charter School currently provides itinerant and supplemental level services to all IDEA eligible students, which may include but is not limited to Learning Support services, Speech and Language services, Occupational Therapy services, Physical Therapy services and Deaf and Hard of Hearing services. Brochures reviewing the student identification process, the parents request for an evaluation process and additional topics are available to all parents and guardians in the lobby. RTI

Response to Intervention (RTI) may sound complicated, but it is a fairly simple process. All students from elementary through high school participate in the RTI process. It starts in the classroom (what we call Tier 1) where students receive core instruction. Gettysburg Montessori Charter School uses Wonders to deliver our core reading instruction and Eureka for math. At Tier 1, the teacher gathers data on the students' performance within the classroom setting. Students performing below grade level will receive Tier 2 services either by the classroom teacher or by a RTI teacher. Lessons are provided three to five days a week for approximately 30 minutes based on student needs. If a student is not making progress, he or she may be moved to Tier 3. Tier 3 means that the student will receive lessons every day for 30-40 minutes in an even smaller group setting, and away from the distractions of the regular classroom. Depending on the growth of the student in this Tier, special education services may be recommended.

RTI is not a specific program or type of teaching. It is a proactive approach to measuring students' skills and using data to decide instructional interventions. The goal is to make each student successful through the use of interventions in the RTI process.

DID YOU KNOW our school participates in the programs offered by the Pennsylvania State Parent Advisory Council (SPAC). This program provides valuable resources and classes to a parent representative from participating schools. This month's tip from our SPAC representative is all about exercising our brains and creating new pathways. How can we help our children's and even our own brains grow? By doing these simple and easy moves called crossing the midline exercises, we can encourage brain cell growth and new neural pathways to form. What does crossing the midline mean? Any movement that crosses one part of the body over the middle line of your body from head to toe or side to side. For example, take your right arm and touch your left knee. Or bend in the middle and touch your toes. Make the peace sign with one hand and the love sign with the other hand, then switch. Go back and forth repeating any of these simple movements to encourage brain cell growth. The better you get the more your brain grows. These are great tools for helping students achieve age appropriate learning readiness at home and at school! To make it even more fun, turn it into a game at home and challenge each other. Have fun crossing the midline!
